

Up-skilling in Footwear

AHA Competency standard: Conduct an Allied Health Assistant (AHA) led, adult footwear program

- On the job training
- Competency development
- Education to the new Pods
- Expanded program to community – admin and up-skilling new AHAs

Descriptor	This unit of competency describes the skills and knowledge required by an AHA to provide, fit and modify footwear to meet the individual needs of adult patients evaluated by the supervising podiatrist, as being suitable. It includes the maintenance and ordering of footwear stock.				
Monash Health Pre-requisites	 Current Employee Monash Health Grade 3 AHA Certificate IV in Allied Health Assistance Appropriately nominated podiatrist as a clinical supervisor/assessor. 				
Monash Health related competencies	Apply prescribed padding, cushioning and dressings Perform a basic foot health screen in conjunction with Low risk Nail Care				
Application	This unit is appropriate for application in bed based or ambulatory care services at Monash Health, where referrals for footwear fitting and provision are firstly triaged by a Podiatrist and then patients are referred to the Allied Health Assistant for footwear fitting, modification & provision.				
	Provision, fit and simple modification of footwear can be delegated by the AHP to the AHA, provided the implemented tasks are within the limits established by the AHP and in line with the, Department of Health, (2012), Supervision & delegation framework for allied health assistants. The AHP should assess whether it is appropriate to delegate the task to the AHA and this may depend on the AHA's personal experience and competence and the specific context for the delegated task.				
	Work performed by the AHA, requires a range of well developed skills where some discretion and judgment is required and individuals will take responsibility for their own outputs.				
Skills recognition	 Completion of HLTAH414B Support the fitting of assistive devices (or the equivalent), as part of Certificate IV in Allied health assistance, whilst relevant to the work role described, is an occupational therapy elective and completion is most likely to have been attained in that context. Completion of Cert IV in Allied health assistance with Podiatry specialisation, would stand a candidate in good stead to meet the requirements of this standard, particularly if combined with HLTAH414B Support the fitting of assistive device(or the equivalent), but verification of skills & knowledge against this standard would still need to be made by the supervising AHP. Prior work experience or training may be accepted to verify competence in the work role described here, but will be assessed on a case by case basis against this standard, by the line manager, clinical supervisor or an appropriate nominee.

AHA Competency standard: Perform a basic foot health screen in conjunction with Low risk Toe Nail Care

Descriptor	This unit of competency describes the skills and knowledge required by an Allied Health assistant, to perform a basic foot health screen and provide Nail care for low risk patients referred for podiatry services.						
Monash Health Pre- requisites	 Current Employee Monash Health Grade 2 or 3 AHA Certificate IV in Allied Health Assistance or equivalent Appropriately nominated podiatrist as a clinical supervisor/assessor. 						
Monash Health related competencies	 Apply prescribed dressings, padding or pressure relief Conduct an Allied Health Assistant (AHA) led, adult footwear program 						
Application	This unit is appropriate for application in bed based or ambulatory care services at Monash Health, where referrals for Low risk Nail care are received by the Podiatry department and then triaged for care by the Podiatrist based on the referral information. Patients triaged by the Podiatrist as "low risk" are then referred to the AHA, who performs a basic foot health screen prior to providing nail care to appropriate patients. Foot screening & nail care can be delegated by the podiatrist to the AHA, provided the implemented tasks are within the limits established by the AHP and in line with the, Department of Health, (2012), Supervision & delegation framework for allied health assistants. The podiatrist should assess whether it is appropriate to delegate the task to the AHA and this may depend on the AHA's personal experience and competence and the specific context for the delegated task. Work performed by the AHA, requires a range of well developed skills where some discretion and judgment is required and individuals will take responsibility for their own outputs.						
Skills recognition	 Completion of Certificate IV in AHA with Podiatry specialisation, particularly completion of HLTAH404B Assist with basic foot Hygiene (or the equivalent), would stand a candidate in good stead to meet the requirements of this standard, but verification of skills & knowledge against this standard would still need to be made by the supervising Podiatrist. Prior work experience or training may be accepted to verify competence in the work role described here, but will be assessed on a case by case basis against this standard, by the line manager, clinical supervisor or an appropriate nominee.

Padding and Off-loading for feet


- Provide padding or pressure relief products to offload pressure areas on feet
- Pod will have management plan
- Cuts out pads, reissues padding or provides devices for offloading

This unit of competency describes the skills and knowledge required by an Allied Health assistant to apply dressings, padding or cushioning, under the directions of a Podiatrist						
Current Employee MonashHealth						
Certificate IV in Allied Health Assistance or equivalent						
Appropriately nominated podiatrist as a clinical supervisor/assessor.						
Conduct an Allied Health Assistant (AHA) led, adult footwear program						
This unit is appropriate for application in bed based or ambulatory care services at Monash Health, where an individualised assessment & management plan have been developed by the Podiatrist. Once established, aspects of this plan can be delegated by the Podiatrist to the AHA, including the (re)application of dressings, padding or cushioning. Wound management cannot be delegated to an AHA.						
(Re)applying dressings, padding and pressure relief, can be delegated by the podiatrist to the AHA, provided the implemented tasks are within the limits established by the AHP and in line with the, Department of Health, (2012), Supervision & delegation framework for allied health assistants. The podiatrist should assess whether it is appropriate to delegate the task to the AHA and this may depend on the AHA's personal experience and competence and the specific context for the delegated task.						
Work performed by the AHA, requires a range of well developed skills where some discretion and judgment is required and individuals will take responsibility for their own outputs.
